I just replaced my wireless router. Is there anything I should do to maximize its security features?

The Network Guy:

Absolutely! A wireless router allows multiple devices, from various parts of the home, to connect to the Internet. The router serves as the access point, so you'll want to make sure it's secure. Otherwise, you're vulnerable to people accessing information on your computer, using your Internet service, and potentially, using your network to commit cybercrimes.

- > Change the default name of your router. The default ID, called a "set service identifier" (SSID), is assigned by the manufacturer. It's best to replace it with a name that is unique and won't be easily guessed by others.
- > Change the password/passphrase on the router. The strongest passphrases are long, include letters, numbers, and symbols, and are not recognizable words.
- > Choose the strongest security option.
- > Create a guest network and passphrase for visitors.
- > Use a firewall. Your operating system and/or security software likely come with a pre-installed firewall, so make sure you turn on these features.

When the first VCR (Video Camera Recorder) was made in 1956, it was the size of a piano.

PenTeleData is Proud to Serve Catasauqua, PA

Catasauqua, Pennsylvania is located at the center of the Lehigh Valley. It is one of the smallest, but most densely populated municipalities in the Valley. Now a residential community, it was once the home to the Crane Iron Works, the first technically and commercially successful anthracite iron furnace. Its first blast in 1840 marked the beginning of the Industrial Revolution in America. Pig iron from the Crane Iron Works was used to make rails, rods, wire, and large castings for boilers, furnaces, and other uses. The iron and allied industries brought much wealth to the town; such that by the early 1900s, Catasauqua had the highest concentration of millionaires per capita of any community in the nation. The Crane Iron Works continued in operation until shortly after World War I.

In 1928, the Fuller Company purchased the Crane site from Replogle Steel Company, which had taken over the Empire Steel and Iron Company. Fuller Company manufactured equipment for the cement industry; their chief product, the revolutionary Fuller-Kinyon pump, is still in use today. By the 1950s, the company was the largest manufacturer of equipment for the cement industry in the world. The Fuller Company was purchased by F. L. Smidth of Denmark in 1990, and by the early 2000s, the site no longer was used for industrial purposes. The borough of Catasauqua purchased the site from F. L. Smidth in 2013. With the purchase of the old Crane Iron site, the borough is targeting development of the canal front and revitalization of downtown areas. A new municipal services building opened on the site in 2017.

Catasauqua is also the hometown of legend Larry Miller, an All-American star of his Catasauqua High School team during the 1960s. He went on to play for the University of North Carolina, where he was awarded ACC Men's Basketball Player of the Year honors in 1966 and 1967. From 1968 to 1975, he played professionally in the American Basketball Association as a member of the Los Angeles Stars, Carolina Cougars, San Diego Conquistadors, Virginia Squires, and Utah Stars. Miller was also a part of an All-America team that included Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, known as Lew Alcindor at that time, Elvin Hayes, Pete Maravich, and Wes Unseld.
